MILLION DOLLAR RAVIOLI CASSEROLE

Ingredients

- 1 lb Italian sausage
- 1 (28-oz) jar spaghetti sauce
- 1 cup cottage cheese
- 1 (8-oz) package cream cheese softened
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 2 tbsp parsley
- ½ tsp garlic powder
- ⅓ cup grated parmesan cheese
- 1 (25-oz) package frozen cheese ravioli
- 2 cups mozzarella cheese

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray a 9x13x2-inch pan with cooking spray. Set aside.

In a large skillet brown Italian sausage. Drain fat from skillet. Stir in spaghetti sauce and set aside.

In a large bowl, combine cottage cheese, softened cream cheese, sour cream, parmesan cheese, parsley and garlic powder. Add ravioli. Toss to coast.

Spread ravioli in the bottom of the prepared baking pan.

Pour meat sauce over ravioli and top with mozzarella cheese.

Bake uncovered for 45 minutes. Allow to cool for 10-15 minutes before serving.

And down the rabbit hole I went.....

I was headed back North to Wisconsin with my new truck in tow. The whole time thinking, "what I was going to do to it?" The options were mindboggling to say the least!

When I got home, I unloaded the truck only to have my neighbor come around the corner and exclaim "I didn't know you were in the scrapping business too!" (Friendly jabs coming from a Chevy guy).

After a good night's sleep, I headed to the garage to see where my base was and what kind on bones I was working with. The truck looked good from the outside and the inside was fairly clean with what I would come to find out later as a few sought after goodies. There was also the ugliness of rusted out cab corners and front cab supports, nothing that couldn't be fixed.

The truck was a 1959 F-100 Custom Cab Short bed, Small back window. It had a 292 Y-Block V-8 (What the heck's a Y-block, Hahaha). It started and idled great but burning some oil and lack of power you could tell it was in need of a rebuild. I wanted to shake it out for a while and see what it had left. A good tune up, plugs, wires, coil, points, oil change and see if it had some life left in her. Now for that sticky gas pedal, it needed some lube -- a couple unplanned burnouts leaving the driveway.....straight pipes screaming....Whoops! I was having fun, more on the Y-block later.

With more research I found out what kind of options I all had with the Custom Cab. I had the stainless front windshield trim, AM radio and antenna, electric windshield washer foot pump and Custom Cab horn ring. Not too bad of a start, I'd say! After looking into the other Ford options, I scored a Magic Air heater box and controls.

At first, I wanted to keep the truck stock with a little touch of hotrod. I bought a dropped axle and other steering components from Nostalgia Sid's to properly lower the truck. When I got it, the axle was flipped on top of the leaf springs and the tie rod was rubbing on the oil pan. Solution---.put grease on it so it slides over the oil pan better ---YIKES!! No way! That was coming out as well as the old worn-out hardware, bearing and brakes, a must when buying an old vehicle. If you plan on driving it make sure you have good, functioning brakes. That was all swapped out and now it sat with a cool rake. It just had the original steel wheels, so it needed a little style. Lynn Barr, thru a member of the Badgerland F-100 club was selling a full set of chrome rims and tires. The price was right and I happened to be in his area. Score! With a new stance and rims it was starting to look right.

I drove it for the next two years to shake the bugs out and really decide where I wanted to go with the build. I went to Dash to the Dells and met some great people who had the knowledge and insight about

these trucks. Gary Mahloch and Blaine Maus being two of them that really stuck out. They have become good friends of mine. They shared their builds with me and taught me a lot! I also ventured down to Tennessee for the F-100 Supernationals and met "Those Guys" Truck Club... lol (good times). That was the start of a big jumping point to see our years of trucks (57-60) and the various calibers of builds. Wow to say the least, now I had even more ideas!

Back home and back to the drawing board. I wanted the classic truck look with the modern touches of drivability and safety. The straight axle is cool but when driving with modern traffic it has its downfalls.

Resto-Mod it was to be.

After doing a lot of research I decided on a No-Limit Engineering Wide Ride front cross member kit which has A-arms, dual adjustable coil over shocks, torsion bar and power steering rack. I also went with their Fat-bar 4 link setup with dual adjustable coil over shocks. I stopped by their shop the next time I was in Tennessee to pick all my parts up. Talk about a kid in a candy store. They build suspension parts for vehicles that get driven hard, exactly what I want for my truck. When discussing my build with Rob, the owner, and what my plans were, he showed me a chassis stiffener kit they had. I'm glad I bought that now. It turned the original chassis of the '59 from a wet noodle to a solid unit with virtually no flex. No frame flex equals more power put to the ground.

Due to me still learning I bought a lot of my parts versus fabricating on my own. I greatly admire the guys who can build all their own pieces and one day I hope I can attain that level of skill. However, this still gave me the opportunity to install the kits which was a lot of measurements and welding not just bolt in and go.

I had the parts; I had the space..... "Nurse, scalpel" and under the knife it went......

What Are You Working On?

What am I Working on Now?

One of these years I'll be done with making changes to my truck. My wife Linda thinks I should have been done several years ago. Still, there seems to be something that isn't quite the way I imagined it over 50 years ago when I owned my first Ford pickup. It was a 1953 farm truck which was kind of rough but it was mine. I was a teenager and living at home and didn't have any space to work on the truck other than my parents drive way.

After I installed a 1955 Ford 292 V8 I started to work on my vision for the truck. I worked on the truck as I could and still use it as my daily driver. Unfortunately, I had to sell the truck in 1968 when I shipped off to active duty in the Navy.





Fast forward to the spring of 1994 when I bought my current truck. I still wanted to have a truck that would meet what I had in mind years previously. The following photo was taken in my drive way in 2002. The blue trim was added sometime after I made by first Dash to the Dells (2000) when the lower trim was grey and there wasn't any blue on the hood.



One of the recent items I worked on was the head light doors. The head lights came from a 1965 Ford Fairlane I found in a bone yard in Sullivan back before the turn of the century. I took everything associated with the headlights from the mounting brackets to the chrome trim. I used the flat trim pieces to help locate the openings in the new trim plates I made to fit the truck's opening. It was hard to locate the round openings around the head lights but it didn't turn out too badly.





During the winter of 2019-20 I changed the look of the trim to have obround openings with the head lights recessed into the opening. This is more of what I had in mind all those years ago. However, I'm still not happy with the way the headlight trim looks. I'm thinking of increasing the width of the obround opening around the headlights. Something to do during this winter.

With all the work I've done on the truck over the years, I never got around to "finish paint" the hood and front fenders. These parts have been coated with Painters Touch rattle can paint since 2000. Well, that's been rectified.

The last week of September I had the hood and front fenders painted with a Base Coat/Clear Coat paint and they look great! But, the hood looks a little naked without the blue wedge on the hood. To get some color back onto the truck I'm thinking of using a vinyl wrap for the hood. We'll see what the truck looks like in thet spring.
